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The Project

FCSW were successful in attracting a \$5000 Coastal Community Grant through the GHCMA to investigate litter dispersal in the Merri, Hopkins and local beaches. Aiming to raise public awareness and understanding of where the litter along local beaches and estuaries is coming from.

Litter surveys were conducted along the Merri & Hopkins rivers, above, within and below Warrnambool, as well as out on the local beaches to determine the amount of litter in the systems that could be attributed to the Warrnambool community and to learn more about the effects that this had on the systems.

The project will conclude with a Community Clean Up Day that will target areas of high priority that have been identified throughout this study.




Many waterfowl are impacted upon by marine litter due to their curiosity and scavenging habits. This Swamp Hen was rescued by the WWRG on the Merri.





No. of litter items at Hopkins River sites




The amount of items of litter was significantly higher in sites surveyed around Warrnambool.
